HISTORY OF THE BARNARD RUN

On Foundation Day 1892, a cross country run, referred to as 'The Steeplechase', was introduced by the Games Committee in place of the 'Annual Paperchase', which had commenced in 1885 when Barnard Castle School was located at Middleton One Row.

Although the Barnard Cup was presented during the summer of 1893, it was backdated to the previous run, a year before, where Durham House was announced as the inaugural winners.

The original course started from the Tees Viaduct and runners then proceeded along the Yorkshire side of the Tees and across Cotherstone Suspension Bridge and back again, crossing the railway by the Stone Bridge, through Flatts Wood to the School. The fixed points were the two bridges, the rest of the course being left to the competitors – a sort of point to point. It is said that the early runners had to contend with angry game keepers, trip-wires and crossing the railway line whilst being pelted with cinders by the engine drivers.

In 1964, The Barnard Run, known affectionately today as the 'Barney Run', moved from Foundation Day to be run during the Lent Term, whereas now, the races are held during the Michaelmas Term. Over the years, there have been many changes to the course for a variety of reasons, and from 1962 until 2016, the course included the run up to Top Tree and the finish by A Block.

Adding to our event's history, in 2017, Prep School pupils competed in the Barney Run for the first time.



SIR BRENDAN FOSTER CBE

Sir Brendan Foster CBE, a British former long-distance runner, enjoyed an impressive sporting and broadcasting career.

Born in Hebburn, Foster represented Great Britain 18 times at the Olympics and Commonwealth Games, as well as a further six occasions at the European Championships. Over the course of his career, he won a European Championships Gold medal in 1974 and an Olympic Bronze medal in 1976.

In the same year as his European Championships success, Brendan was awarded the BBC's prestigious Sports Personality of the Year award.

In addition to his exploits on the track, Sir Brendan is world renowned for establishing The Great North Run. He was inspired to do so after competing in the Round the Bays Race in New Zealand, in 1979, and a mere two years later, the first Great North Run was staged on 28th June 1981.

12,000 runners participated in the inaugural race, which has since grown to in excess of 60,000 participants, making it one of the biggest running events in the world.

Following his glittering athletics career, Foster worked for the BBC as a broadcaster and commentator between 1980 and 2017, covering nine summer Olympic Games, every Commonwealth Games since 1982 and every World Championships since its debut back in 1983.

In the 1976 New Year Honours, Brendan was appointed a Member of the Order of the British Empire (MBE) for services to athletics, and promoted to Commander of the same Order (CBE) in the 2008 New Year Honours for services to sport. Continued success followed as in 2010, he was duly inducted into the England Athletics Hall of Fame.

Later, in December 2016, Foster was given the Freedom of the City of Newcastle, the city's highest honour and a year later, in recognition of his major contributions to the advancements of athletics, he was awarded the World Athletics' highest award, the Golden Order of Merit.

Foster was knighted in the 2020 Birthday Honours for services to international and national sport and to culture in North East England.

For this year's 'Barney Bash', a series of charitable runs leading up to the historic Barney Run, we are supporting an incredible cause, *Cardiac Risk in the Young (CRY)*.

Every week in the UK at least 12 young people die of undiagnosed heart conditions. Since its formation in 1995, CRY has been working to reduce the frequency of young sudden cardiac death (YSCD).CRY supports young people diagnosed with potentially life-threatening cardiac conditions and offers bereavement support to families affected by YSCD. CRY promotes and develops heart screening programmes and funds medical research. CRY publishes and distributes medical information written by leading cardiologists for the general public. CRY funds specialist referral, screening and cardiac pathology services at leading UK hospitals.

The Barney Bash was initially introduced to provide a means for Houses to select their Barney Run teams. Pupils run the same course as the Barney Run itself. They are a House competition in themselves, where every member of the House can contribute to Nailing Up at the end of term; all pupils in every House count! Lastly, but perhaps more significantly, the Barney Bashes are fundraising events. There are three Bashes: the Seniors (Years 11-13), the Inters (Years 9 & 10) and the Juniors (Years 7 & 8). The aim is for pupils to be sponsored by as many people as possible to help raise money for our chosen charity this term, CRY.

Adding to the occasion for 2023, in his final year as Headmaster, Mr Jackson agreed (reluctantly!) to run the Bash! Owing to a staggering amount raised for CRY by staff and the governing body, he also competed in fancy dress!
